It is at times like this that we see the best and worst of people. We see those who are working tirelessly and selflessly to make sure that we have the best health care available despite putting themselves and their families at risk. We see those who ensure that our lives continue to function and we can get the basic necessities. My thanks go out to all the charities who are working in overdrive around the world, providing support to the many who have found themselves plunged into poverty and homelessness. Burma Railway, I was reminded of the strength and resilience of the human spirit and the importance of looking after each other. His message was that all the people who are thinking only of themselves and complaining about being in isolation, needed to look back at history and take a good hard look at themselves. The interview certainly provided a grounding perspective.

ANZAC DAY: DRIVEWAY AT DAWN

This would be the first Anzac Day that I can remember where people can't gather to acknowledge those who have served and died in wars and peace keeping missions. One way we can show our respect and commemorate those who have served is through the 'Driveway at Dawn' movement. This is supported by the RSL and we are asked to stand in our driveways before 6am with a lighted candle, light from a phone, etc. and observe the minute's silence. This is an innovative way of getting together and feeling connected within our community as well as showing our respect.

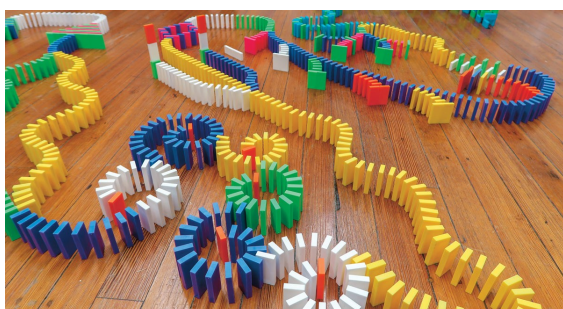

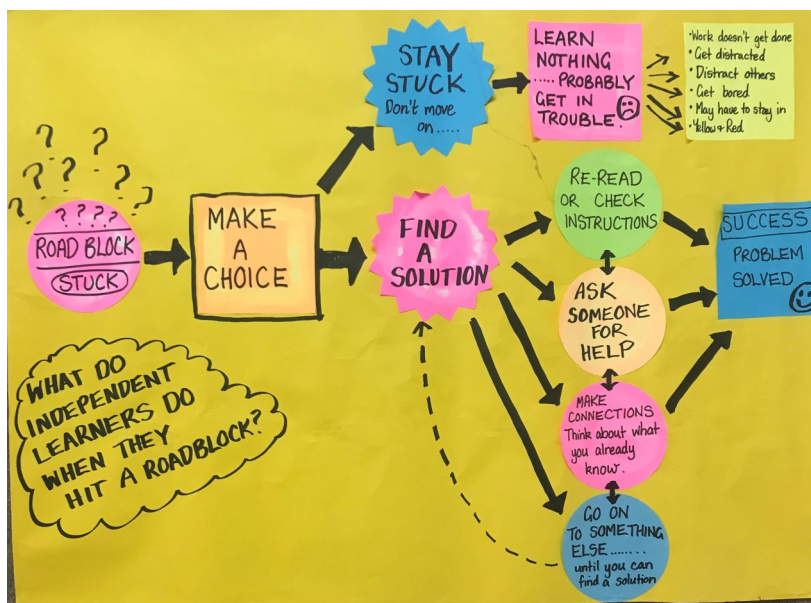
INDEPENDENT WORKING SKILLS

lives and come under the banner of '21st Century Learning'.

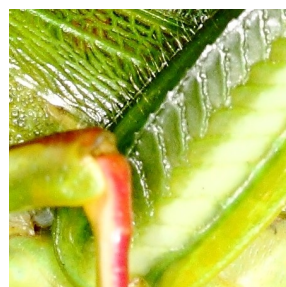
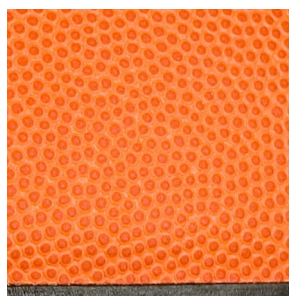
It is okay to let students make mistakes and learn from them. If you are doing the thinking for your children they are not going to learn and their teachers won't know what to focus on to support them in their learning.
