EASTER MESSAGE FROM FR. SIJU

"Greetings!", "do not be afraid!" were the words with which Jesus greeted his disciples after his Resurrection. At this Easter in 2020, let us not be afraid of what is happening around the world, rather be greeted by our Risen Lord.

We are now so used to the term "flatten the curve"! I wish to briefly reflect on this term at this Easter. I wish you and your family a Very Happy Easter. May the Risen Lord give you peace and fullness of life.

Undoubtedly, we all are undergoing a very strange time during Covid-19. Our life has changed significantly. Our faith life has temporarily taken a different course. What Should I do if I Can't go to Mass?

Catholics are encouraged to make a 'spiritual communion'. St. John Paul II writes that "it is good to cultivate in our hearts a constant desire for the sacrament of the Eucharist. This was the origin of the practice of 'spiritual communion', which has happily been established in the Church for centuries and recommended by saints who were masters of the spiritual life. Saint Teresa of Jesus wrote: 'When you do not receive communion and you do not attend Mass, you can make a spiritual communion, which is a most beneficial practice; by it the love of God will be greatly impressed on you." (Ecclesia Eucharistia, no. 34).

How Do I Make a Spiritual Communion?

Below are recommendations for how to make a 'spiritual communion' when unable to participate in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The recommendations can be adapted based upon personal and family needs.

Gather with others in your household and begin a time of prayer with the sign of the cross.

Take time to read and reflect upon the readings from Sunday Mass. You can find the readings at usccb.org and a Sunday Gospel reflection on our YouTube channel. Additionally, a weekly televised Sunday Mass is available to watch at adw.org/tvmass.

Share prayer intentions quietly or aloud.

Pray the Lord's Prayer.

Pray one of the following prayers of spiritual communion (see below).

Close with the sign of the cross

First Reading: Acts 10:34. 37-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

Peter addressed Cornelius and his household: 'You must have heard about the recent happenings in Judaea; about Jesus of Nazareth and how he began in Galilee, after John had been preaching baptism. God had anointed him with the Holy Spirit and with power, and because God was with him. Jesus went about doing good and curing all who had fallen into the power of the devil. Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judaea and in Jerusalem itself: and also to the fact that they killed him by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand. Now we are those witnesses – we have eaten and drunk with him after his resurrection from the dead - and he has ordered us to proclaim this to his people and to tell them that God has appointed him to judge everyone, alive or dead. It is to him that all the prophets bear this witness: that all who believe in Jesus will have their sins forgiven through his name.'

But when Christ is revealed – and he is your life – you too will be revealed in all your glory with him.

Gospel: Mt 28:1-10

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew After the Sabbath, and towards dawn on the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala and the other Mary went to visit the sepulchre. And all at once there was a violent earthquake, for the angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled away the stone and sat on it. His face was like lightning, his robe white as snow. The guards were so shaken, so frightened of him, that they were like dead men. But the angel spoke; and he said to the women, 'There is no need for you to be afraid. I know you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here, for he has risen, as he said he would. Come and see the place where he lay, then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has risen from the dead and now he is going before you to Galilee; it is there you will see him." Now I have told you.' Filled with awe and great joy the women came quickly away from the tomb and ran to tell the disciples.

And there, coming to meet them, was Jesus. 'Greetings,' he said. And the women came up to him and, falling down before him, clasped his feet. Then Jesus said to them, 'Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers that they must leave for Galilee; they will see me there.'

First Reading.: Acts 2:42-47 Second Reading.: 1 Pt 1:3-9 Gospel Reading: Jn 20:19-31 This analogy of 'flatten the curve' can be applied to our own life too. We live in a society which is filled with greed – which we witnessed in the bulk buying of things from super market in recent times. Our society has become so self-centred – thus unwilling to share our good with others. It has become so worldly – that we forget about our origin and end. Our origin and end is in God.

I read a wonderful story of a rich business man. He had a wish and thought to himself. Would I have to leave behind all my riches which I worked hard to earn? Can I take with me at least one percent of what I possess when I die? When I die, would someone help me to take some of my possessions with me?

One day, he shared his wish to his soul friend who was renowned for his wisdom and logical thinking. The friend advised his rich business friend, saying. When you travel to the USA from your country, which currency do you carry with you? The rich man immediately replied: our currency has no value in the USA, so I change our currency into 'US dollars'. What about when you go to England? Without any hesitation he replied, when I go to England, I would take with me Pounds'.

Then his wise friend said to his rich friend: when you reach heaven after your death, the currency that is valid in heaven are the good works you do while you live here on earth.

The wisdom of his soul friend made the rich man reflect on his life thus far, and began to do charitable works by sharing his wealth. Thus, he began to accumulate that currency which, he now ascertained himself, will be valid to ensure his entry into heaven. Thus, this rich business man flattened the curve of his pride and self-confidence by sharing his wealth and undertaking charitable works. As a result, he ensured his passport to heaven.

Dear friends, no matter how rich or poor, how informed or uninformed, how capable or incapable, how strong or weak, no matter where we live on earth, one day we all must die. There is no one to accompany us when we die. It is impossible to take some material things with us after our death. We come into this world alone and empty handed; and we return from this world alone. However, if we have done good works, they accompany us. The good works we do to help others — in between our birth and death — would be the only possessions we would be taking with us after our death.

This year's Easter comes to remind us to flatten the curve of our pride, greed, self-interests, thus ensuring our passport to heaven.

Dear friends, I wish you once again a Very Happy and Joyful celebration of Easter. I pray that you all stay safe and I look forward to reuniting with you all in our celebrations of the Eucharist sooner.

Pope Francis on facing challenges of the coronavirus pandemic

In an interview with the Italian daily newspaper, "La Repubblica", Pope Francis says he is praying for an end to the coronavirus pandemic, and asks everyone to be close to those who have lost loved ones.

"I asked the Lord to stop the epidemic: 'Lord, stop it with your hand'. That is what I prayed for". Pope Francis revealed the content of his prayer in an interview with Italian journalist, Paolo Rodari, published in Wednesday's edition of "La Repubblica" newspaper. Pope Francis made this prayer when he visited the Roman churches of Saints Mary Major and Marcello on the Via del Corso last Sunday.

In the interview, Pope Francis offers advice about how to face the daily challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic: "We need to rediscover the concreteness of small things, the small acts of kindness shown to those who are close to us, family, friends. We need to realize that our treasure lies in small things. There are tiny gestures that sometimes get lost in the routine of everyday life, gestures of tenderness, affection, compassion, that are nevertheless decisive, important", he says. The Pope gives the examples of sharing "a hot plate of food, a caress, a hug, a phone call... These are familiar, attentive gestures regarding everyday details that make life meaningful, and create communion and communication amongst us".

Pope Francis observes that many time communication is only "virtual". "Instead we should discover a new closeness", he says. "Real relationships made of attentiveness and patience". The Pope describes how some families eat together at home in silence – not because they are listening to one another, but because "the parents are watching television while they eat, and their children are on their mobile phones". Pope Francis describes this kind of family as "monks isolated from one another". There is no communication here, he says. "Instead, listening to one another is important because we understand one another's needs, struggles, desires". "There is a language made of concrete gestures that must be safeguarded", continues the Pope. The suffering people are enduring at this time should make us open to this language.

In the interview, Pope Francis expresses his appreciation for healthcare personnel and volunteers. He thanks those who dedicate themselves to helping others in this way, and describes them as "an example" of the concreteness of small acts of kindness. The Pope invites "everyone to be close to those who have lost loved ones, to try to accompany them in every way possible". We must all be dedicated to consoling others, he adds. Pope Francis mentions that he was particularly struck by an article he read recently. In it, the author indicates how "our behaviour always affects others' lives". The example cited was that of how not paying our taxes, leads to lack of healthcare services.

Finally, Pope Francis invites everyone to hope — even those who do not believe. "We are all children of God, and He watches over us", says the Pope. "Even those who have not yet met God, those who do not have the gift of faith, can find their way through the good things that they believe in. They can find strength in their love for their children, their family, their brothers and sisters. Someone might say: 'I cannot pray because I do not believe'. But at the same time", concludes Pope Francis, "we can believe in the love of the people we have around us, and there we can find hope". **By Vatican News**
