PROJECT COMPASSION & HELPING OTHERS



CATHOLIC IDENTITY SURVEY

Every 4 years we are invited to participate in a Catholic identity survey (ECSI) to find out what is important to parents, staff and students about being a part of a Catholic school community. The online survey gathers responses from students in Years 5 and 6, all



staff and a representative sample of parents. When you receive the survey information we would really appreciate if you could have a go at completing it—the statements or questions can be quite challenging (for staff as well as parents) but the more responses we have the more reliable the data we receive. This information is used in planning our future directions.

DUCK CUP

Once again, we are put in the position of deciding whether to go ahead with the Duck Cup or not due to the pandemic. After much consideration, we have decided that we will not hold the Duck Cup as a public event this year. This decision has been based on current guidelines for holding a healthy and safe community event from Wellington Shire Council, the Victorian Government and Diocese of Sale Catholic Education Limited (DOSCEL); we have deemed it

too difficult to achieve full compliance with the resources we have at hand.

P & F have made the decision not to postpone the Duck Cup to a later date but to hold the Duck Cup race itself as a closed event on the 28th March as scheduled. If possible, we will 'live stream' the race and we will invite 'scrutineers' from the Heyfield Lions Club to attend to ensure that the race runs according to the rules. All winners of the Duck Cup will be notified as soon as possible.

As we will still be holding the race, we ask for your support in selling tickets again. The tickets will be reduced in price to \$10 each to reflect that we are not offering the actual Duck Cup Carnival activities. Each family will be given a small book of tickets to sell and will be asked to support the P & F through selling tickets out the front of the supermarket. This will be on a roster that will be sent out shortly.

This is our major fundraiser for the year and is widely supported by very generous sponsors. We will continue to promote them through the P & F

Facebook page and school signage.

Thank you for being understanding in the circumstances. It is hoped that P & F will be able to bring a bit of Duck Cup cheer to our students at school so stay posted.

What is the difference between a Stick insect and a Praying Mantis

Last week Tahlia and I found a Praying Mantis in our garden, we named him Polo. We thought it would be a great idea to bring it to school and introduce it to Audrey and Augustus our class stick insects. Luckily we have a few budding Entomologists amongst us who quickly pointed out that stick insects and praying mantis are very different species and should <u>NEVER</u> be housed together.

Found in similar warm dense lush,green environments, praying mantises and walking sticks are different types of insects. Walking sticks are also called stick insects, and praying mantises are also known as praying mantids. Although they usually come in similar colors and sometimes live in the same garden. There are a lot of differences between these two insects. They have completely different needs and instincts when it comes to food, mating, raising young and surviving.

Stick insects lay eggs. Their young are born appearing like a tiny adult of their kind. They climb up the plant that their eggs were on, and begin eating the leaves. For months, stick insects molt and grow, until they reach adult size. Praying mantis. Females are larger than males, and sometimes cannibalize their mate after breeding. Females may lay up to 400 eggs, which hatch once Spring arrives. Newly hatched mantises may cannibalize each other, however stick insects do not.

Both walking sticks and praying mantises use camouflage to hide from predators and blend into their environments. Walking sticks are sometimes able to mimic the colors of their surroundings to better blend in. Their shape mimics the appearance of a dead stick, which they use to hide in their environment. Praying mantises often are colored similarly to the plants in their environment. Some mantises from the Far East mimic the colors of flowers.

Walking sticks eat only leaves and plant life. They can feed on the very leaves and plants that allow them to blend in and hide from predators. Praying mantises are carnivorous. They live off of and eat other insects. The praying mantis hunts by grabbing passing insects with its sharp forearms, biting it, and eating it while it is still alive. Some praying mantises are able to hunt mice and small birds.

Visually they are different from one another. A Praying Mantis has a triangular head and an abdomen that is visible. To the trained eye these insects are very different to one another.


