NAPLAN

Students in Years 3 and 5 will be doing the NAPLAN test soon. This testing will take place on Tuesday 11th, Wednesday 12th and Thursday 13th May. The NAPLAN provides a snapshot of a student's progress in some aspects of literacy and numeracy at one point in time, in this case May. From a teaching perspective the information has limited value as by the time results are received in September students have moved on in their learning. What the NAPLAN does do, particularly with larger schools, is provide school wide data trends that may be used to target priority needs. We strongly encourage parents to speak with their child's classroom teacher if they want an accurate picture of their child as a learner. At a school level, we collect assessment information from a wide variety of sources to ensure we are directing change in the right areas.


