




## 5/6 BOOK GROUP SHARING

## A MODERN DAY TAKE ON CHRISTMAS

*This is a reflection that I read in a St Vinnies newsletter to its members and it really resonated with me. It was written by Kevin McMahon, the State President of St Vincent de Paul.*

This is a busy time of the year, so I thought it was appropriate to start out with a reflection. I would like to offer some brief thoughts for your consideration on what I get from the Christmas story. We hear so much about the lack of contemporary application of our Christian message. However, I think that the real story has so much relevance to us today. We all know the details, but here are my insights.

When I hear of a child gifted to a young woman yet to be married, I think of the many single mothers we assist, some unmarried, some left to look after kids after being abandoned by a husband or partner.

When I listen to the story of Elizabeth, I recall all the couples going through the heartbreak of trying to have a child without success. At least her story ends with a great outcome.

When I recall the birth in a stable, I cannot help thinking of the thousands of homeless both here and abroad. Thankfully that was one family for whom it was a temporary situation brought about by the Census circumstances.

We hear so much about refugees – the Christmas story is one about a refugee family two thousand years ago, fleeing to Egypt to escape threatened violence to the child in the family. Sound familiar today?

When I think of the choice of the lowly shepherds to be the first to hear of the birth of Jesus, it reminds us that Christ still brings the Good News to all regardless of social and economic standing. I hope that all of us can be as open to hearing the Good News being offered to those open and humble enough to listen.

Finally, we have the magi or kings. Personally, I am never quite sure how to understand their role, even though they appear in every Nativity play. But I do like the star – the light that guides them in their search for the new king. As I

have said at many functions this year, we have a light to shine to the world – our great work in Christ's name. I urge you all to tell people what we do, always in the name of Jesus.



So, is the Christmas story relevant today? Definitely!

As we take the time to reflect back on the year, we realise that we can feel proud of our part in making a difference to so many lives. St Vinnies helps so many people every year, asking only "How can we help?" That is our key question, and follow up questions are only necessary to do our proper assessment in that regard. We pride ourselves that we help everyone, regardless of personal circumstances every one of us, in our own way, has had a part in this good news story. When we take a break over the holiday period to "recharge our batteries", let us take a moment to remember those not as fortunate as we are.
