current ones are looking a bit worn out, especially the tires. I know this will be a popular addition for our junior students.




'TRAIN TO GAIN' INSPIRATIONAL PEOPLE

Albert Einstein was a physicist who was famous for **devising his theory of relativity**, which revolutionized our understanding of space, time, gravity, and the universe. He won the Nobel Prize for physics in 1921 – this was a huge honour.

He was considered the most influential physicist of the 20th century and he was dyslexic. Dyslexia just means your brain works differently, making it harder to learn and use written language. This makes school tough so people with dyslexia have to be determined to succeed. Einstein loved mathematics and science, but he disliked grammar and always had problems with spelling. He couldn't speak well until he was nine years old and everyone thought he wouldn't be able to learn things. But, he never gave up even when others gave up on him.

Through hard work to overcome his dyslexia he went on to

become a world famous scientist whose contributions to physics will always be remembered in history. He is inspirational for everyone.
